I'm the workhouse _____ .

Workhouses were where poor people who had no job or home lived. People living there would have to work to earn their keep. The Fareham workhouse had room for 300 people at once. Most people were scared of ending up in a workhouse as the work was hard and conditions were poor.



It wasn't until the end of the Victorian era that people started getting electric lighting in their homes. Before that families would have to make do with candles. If you were rich, these might be made of beeswax, but if you were poor they would be made out of tallow (sheep or cow fat).

Schools didn't become free in this country until 1891, meaning that only children from the very richest families (and usually only boys) would have gone to school before this date. Most other children would have been sent out to work to earn money.
